We've embraced a simple 4 + 4 system, such that interns alternate between 4 weeks of inpatient and 4 weeks of outpatient as shown in this candy cane like figure. PGY2 and PGY3 years are similarly structured, although they have less inpatient time than interns. In general, you'll have very few continuity clinic sessions during a non ambulatory block.
